Top 10 Team Canada Olympic Moments

In honur of the Tokyo 2020 Olympic Games starting July 23, we're sharing memorable moments in Team Canada's history at past Olympic Games & Olympic Winter Games.

You could hear cheers from every home and sports bar across the country when Sidney Crosby scored the "Golden Goal" at the 2010 Winter Olympics in Vancouver.

Donovan Bailey became one of Canada's most iconic sports figures when he set the 100m world record at Atlanta 1996.

In his Olympic debut, Daniel Igali became Canada's first Olympic wrestling champion at the 2000 Sydney Olympic Games.

Following Igali's Olympic win in 2000, Carol Huynh then became Canada's first women's wrestling champion when she won gold at the 2008 Olympic Games in Beijing.

Tessa Virtue and Scott Moir, who had skated together for 20 years, shared their last competitive dance at the PyeongChang 2018 Olympic Winter Games... and won Gold!





What better way to celebrate gold than with a cold beer! That's what Jon Montgomery did after winning a gold medal in skeleton at the 2010 Winter Olympics in Vancouver.

Joannie Rochette skated in the short program at the 2010 Winter Olympics in Vancouver just two days after her mother passed away. With the whole country behind her, she won bronze.

Just 10 weeks out from the Games, Silken Laumann's right leg was shattered in an on-water accident. Despite her diagnosis, she competed in the 1992 Olympic Games, and against all odds, won bronze.

We all watched in awe as Cindy Klassen skated to a gold, a silver, and three bronze medals - the best ever single-Games performance by a Canadian Olympian - at the 2006 Olympic Winter Games.

After a back country snowboarding accident in 2017 that resulted in multiple injuries, Regina's own Mark McMorris took home the bronze medal in the men's snowboard slopestyle at the 2018 Winter Olympics.
